Sustrans Ucycle Project funding extended



Following the success of the City Council's bid to the Department for Transport Local Sustainable Transport Fund, the Sustrans Ucycle Project is now to be extended, to 2014, which is very good news.

As well as continuing to promote cycling in our two local Universities and at the QMC it will now be extended to include local Further Education Colleges.

New City Charge Card Bike Hire and Storage scheme

Nottingham's LTSF bid success also means good news for the development of the City Charge Card Bike Hire and Storage scheme, as described in detail on our website at http://www.pedals.org.uk/citycard_cycle_hire



This scheme, using Pashley bikes as in the photo above is being developed by Andy Gibbons, the City Council's Public Transport Manager and a keen cyclist.

The bikes, based at a series of hubs, such as the Broad Marsh bus station, which serve several local employment areas, would be available for hire by people with Citycards, and there would also be opportunities for people who preferred to use their own bikes in combination with buses, for longer journeys.

90 bikes were delivered by the end of September and covered, secure pick-up and storage facilities installed at various hubs, starting with the Broad Marsh and Queen's Drive Park and Ride site. Meanwhile, a first standalone docking station has been installed at the Broad Marsh bus station, using smartcards to lock and release bikes. You can use this with your own bikes.

This is now working and is on loan for demonstration purposes. If you want to be part of the trial, please register in the BM Travel Centre and you'll be given a designated smartcard – there is a limited number. Please note that this is being trialled for OWN bikes only and is not part of the Cycle Hire scheme at this stage. If it works for own bikes the City Council will look – subject to tendering regulations etc – to see how it might be adapted for cycle hire.

The whole scheme is due to start in April 2012.

Nottingham Station cycle compound – smartcard area access proposal

To help further with the security of the
Nottingham Station Bike Compound opened
in July 2010 on the north side of the Station
there plans for the eastern half to be
accessible only by smart cards from later
this autumn.

Clifton-Wilford cycling commuter corridor improvements

Pedals has welcomed most of the improvements for cyclists on the 'commuter corridor' route between Clifton and the City Centre via Wilford.



There are also plans to improve signing of the Compound from outside the Station and we also want to see its existence publicised clearly on internal signs.

With a recent spate of thefts of bikes from the cycle stands from the Porte Cochere area just inside the front of the Station British Transport Police were adamant that these must be removed and all cyclists encouraged to use the Bike Compound.

This area is anyway to be redeveloped for shops and cafes only as part of the 'Hub' Station redevelopment, with only a few stands then included, for very short term visits to make enquiries or make tickets etc.

We had to lobby hard to get these stands provided and we have also now been lobbying for good cycling provision within the main 'Hub' project including stands on the southern (Queen's Road) side of the Station.

These improved cycle facilities at the junction of Main Road, Wilford and Wilford Lane, and toucan crossing and Advanced Stop Lanes at the junction of Maid Marian Way with Canal Street.



Our main criticism however was of the lack of provision for direct right turns from Main Road on to the cycle path by Clifton Lane towards Clifton Bridge.

New 'Big Track' section open by Clifton Bridge

We were glad to see the completion this summer of a new off-road stretch of The Big Track route on the north bank of the Trent between Clifton Bridge and Grove Farm.



Problems for cyclists with Wigman Road layout changes

We were appalled to see the new problems for cyclists in the basically welcome new 20mph road safety scheme on Wigman Road near the Harvey Hadden Stadium.



For various reasons Pedals was not consulted about this scheme which has created new pinchpoints (as on part of the new Trowell Road cycle lanes earlier this year) and other problems for cyclists, especially those with trailers or adult bikes.

We have now made the City Council aware of these and are discussing the scope for possible improvements.

Lenton Lane car parking obstructive pose more and more danger to cyclists and other road users

Cyclists and other road users are now more and more at risk from the obstruction of often very hazardous car parking on Gregory Street and Lenton Lane between the QMC and the railway bridge.



We are now pressing the City Council and Police for urgent action to tackle this without waiting for the changes to the road layout when the NET extension to Beeston and Chilwell is built along this route.

Other City Council consultations with Pedals

Recent detailed responses have included a series of local highway schemes (e.g. Aspley Lane), the new City Local Plan and the draft statement of Policy on the use of cycle paths by Horseriders.

A52 between the Bramcote and Dunkirk flyover islands:



We have made a detailed response to the Highways Agency's recent and very disappointing 'Non-Motorised User Study' for the stretch of the A52 Trunk Road (Derby Road and Clifton Boulevard) between the Bramcote and Dunkirk islands, and including the QMC roundabout.

We coordinated our response with several other interested organisations including the Sustrans Ucycle Project.

Cycle lanes removal protest to County Council

We reacted with a strong protest in May to the County Council's removal of two very well used and helpful cycle lanes on Musters Road in West Bridgford at its junctions with Melton Road and Rectory Road.

This protest included an online petition signed by well over 100 local people (and not just cyclists) complaining that the layout had been made much more dangerous again.

Since then it is clear that many less confident cyclists have given up riding through the junction or taken to the pavements while even more confident cyclists, continuing to stick to the road, can often find it quite intimidating, especially when drivers cant squeeze past you in the narrower lanes and then do dangerous zig-zag manoeuvres to get past!

We also pointed out all these problems at a site meeting with Councillor Richard Jackson, the County Council's Portfolio Holder for Transport and Highways but with very little benefit.

The County Council introduced this disastrous change because their main concern was to squeeze in a bit more capacity for general traffic, of higher priority to them than the safety of cyclists or other road users!

Beeston cycle parking improvements on the way

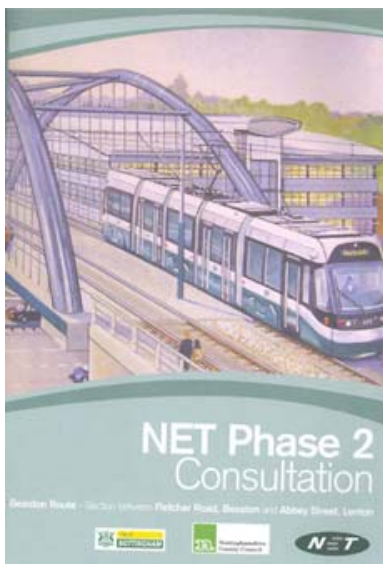
Following Pedals pressure for improved cycle parking in Beeston, John Delaney of Broxtowe Borough Council has recently said that improvements are at last on the way, starting with 5 stands outside Specsavers in

Beeston Square and then 2/3 stands as part of the new Borough-operated Beeston railway station car park (under the flyover so will be covered, CCTV'd and lit).



Additional covered cycle parking outside the council offices should appear before March next year and possibly also on the "Tesco jitty" between the High Road, and the Tesco store (subject to agreement with Tesco)

Cyclists and the NET extension plans to Chilwell and Clifton

With work due to start soon on the two NET extension lines, we have been renewing our pleas for cycle routes

alongside these, where space permits.

In particular we want to see cycle paths alongside the new tram lines from Chilwell to Toton, and from Coronation Avenue (Wilford) along the former railway through to Ruddington Lane (Silverdale) and the South Nottingham and Wilford Industrial Estate, shown in the photo below.



Both these links would help augment the local cycle network and, in the case of the Wilford route (on the former railway) would fill in a 'missing link' in the longer route from the City Centre to Ruddington.

We are also keeping a close eye on the latest detailed tram alignment plans on sections such as Chilwell Road (Beeston) and the High Road where there is very little room for cycle lanes alongside the tram and more potential for cyclists to get their wheels stuck in tram tracks.



To help address such potential problems particular care is needed in the detailed

road layouts as well other measures to educate cyclists and other road users on how to minimise potential hazards.

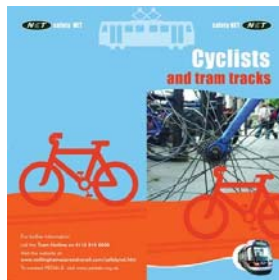


On this particular stretch kerbside motor vehicle parking will be greatly restricted and this also should help cyclists

We have learned much from cyclists experience of NET Line One, opened in 2004, and this has informed our detailed discussions on the two extension lines.



We worked with the NET Project Team on an advice note for cyclists when Line One opened and we will be reviewing this as work progresses on the new lines.

Ridewise Transition Funding

Bid success update from Gary Smerdon-White, Chair of Ridewise

Good news from Ridewise is that they have been successful in applying for £50k of Transition Funds from BIG Lottery. Unfortunately this does not allow them to directly carry on or expand its existing services this year because the funding is to help.

- Develop a more resilient mix of public, subsidised and commercial funding and ensure future sustainability with a package of high quality services
- Provide frontline neighbourhood services more effectively to the needy without reducing quality or impact
- Respond more professionally to service and funding opportunities in the public and private sectors

The sort of work to be undertaken this year includes:-

- Business Development – to look at existing services and opportunities with a view to extending and developing new services
- Monitoring and Evaluation – implement a system to evidence the benefit RideWise provides over a wide range of areas such as health, environment, employee well-being and road congestion.
- Develop some best practice pilots in neighbourhoods covering cycle instruction and group rides, developing volunteer networks and bike recycling schemes.
- Seek funding in areas which RideWise has not traditionally engaged

From this work they will be aiming to greatly improve and extend their health and schools programmes plus develop new services to paying individuals, community groups and public and private sector organisations. The work will also provide valuable input into the City Council's successful £4.9m Local Sustainable Transport Fund programme.
